DCNR'S EDUCATION COORDI-NATOR COMMENDS JENNINGS

In the October issue of the *Resource*, DCNR's monthly publication, **Joan S. Clippinger**, the newly appointed education coordinator, complimented Jennings Environmental Education Center:

"I have an excellent point of comparison as far as where we stand nationally in environmental education," said Clippinger.
"Attending a biodiversity conference this summer in Florida, I quickly learned this state is a national leader in EE."

She points to Jennings Environmental Education Center in Butler County where a coalition of state agencies, private businesses, miners, scientists, and students all are committed to rectifying severe acid mine drainage. The project on the center grounds has gained international prominence.

"The Jennings project has emerged as a case study in what can be accomplished when everyone gets involved," Clippinger said. "I will be seeking a balance in our environmental education programs that fosters more business and industry involvement. Too often, I believe, industry thinks environmental educators are picking on them, and that is not the case. They are a valuable information source, as the Jennings project shows."

8th ANNUAL MONASTERY RUN PROJECT SYMPOSIUM AT SAINT VINCENT COLLEGE

Once again, members of the Slippery Rock Watershed Coalition seek to broaden their horizons, network with fellow watershed organizations, and spread the word about the work being done in the Slippery Rock Creek watershed. The destination, Latrobe, PA. On Thursday, November 16th, the Saint Vincent College Environmental Education Center in cooperation with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency held a symposium entitled "Abandoned Mine Drainage Education" at the Saint Vincent College Science Center. As the title implies, education was the focus of this event. Daniel A. Dougherty, a Grove City College biology student of Dr. Fred Brenner, authored an abstract and presented a poster titled "Seaton Creek Water Quality Monitoring". The poster illustrated data obtained via several years of monitoring Seaton Creek, a stream heavily impacted by abandoned mine drainage, by Grove City College students. In addition to Dan, Will Taylor and David Johnson from the Jennings Environmental Education Center were on hand with a poster demonstrating the educational programs offered by Jennings that deal with abandoned mine drainage. Jennings and Grove City College greatly appreciate the opportunity to present their programs and thank Saint Vincent College for a rewarding day.





What is a watershed?

A watershed is any area of land drained by water. Everyone lives in a watershed, even you! When it rains or snows on an area of land, it eventually runs downhill until it reaches a stream. Small streams flow into other bigger streams, which flow into rivers, which flow into even bigger rivers, until it reaches the ocean.

So what is the big deal about watersheds? Water is a precious gift. Without it, life would not exist on earth. Out of all the water on earth, only about 2% is freshwater; the rest is too salty to be of use to us. The water used by the people, plants, and animals living downstream is affected by what happens to the water upstream, and by what happens to it along its journey downstream.

The Slippery Rock Watershed Coalition was formed to help restore a watershed impacted by abandoned mine drainage. You can help us!
