On this evening, the winners of the Awards for Excellence were officially an-





Highlighting Other Partnership Efforts (HOPE!)

Dunkard Creek





On a cool February morning in southwestern Pennsylvania the sounds of bulldozers and heavy equipment could be heard rumbling through the river valley around Dunkard Creek in Greene County. Construction on the first passive treatment system in the **Dunkard Creek Watershed** was begun by Mathew's Farms and McKay & Gould Drilling. Terri Davin (above left) from the Greene County Watershed Alliance couldn't be happier to see this abandoned mine discharge (lower right) finally being treated. This project



will dramatically improve aquatic life in the lower 6.2 miles of the stream by removing over 40 tons of iron and aluminum every year! Thanks go out to the **Mathew's Family**, the **Greene County Watershed Alliance**, and **Quality Aggregates**, who

are working in conjunction with **Stream Restoration Incorporated** and **BioMost, Inc**. Without all of these groups working together, this monumental step towards restoring this degraded watershed would not be possible.
