Jane Nugent, host of "Garden Talk" WPTT 1360 AM on Saturdays from 1:30 PM to 3:00 PM, invited the Slippery Rock Watershed Coalition to share her booth Saturday (1/27/07) and Sunday (1/28/07) at the

What a wonderful opportunity to "spread the word" about watershed restoration and the ability of everyone to "make a difference" by partnering with federal, state, and local agencies, local businesses, and volunteers of all ages. We were surprised when so many people who stopped by to chat knew of the watershed efforts in western PA and, of course, knew about the Ohio River Watershed Celebration!!! We

also learned about native plants, soils, and composting from Jane Nugent and her listeners!!! For instance, did you know that oak leaves do not break down as readily as maple leaves during composting? This may come in handy when formulating reci-



pes for compost used in passive treatment!!! Thanks again to Jane Nugent for providing this tremendous outreach opportunity!!!

A Guest Lecture...In Germany!!!

Participants in the SRWC have given their fair share of guest lectures before, but never this far from home! **Dr. Valentin Kefeli**, soil scientist and participant of the Slippery Rock Watershed Coalition, will have the special opportunity to give a lecture this month at the **Humboldt University** in **Berlin, Germany!** Dr. Kefeli will be speaking to students regarding his recent work on landscape recultivation, phytodesign, and the phenolics cycle. Dr. Kefeli will guest lecture in the class of **Dr. Rudolph Edwald**, where the students are particularly interested in the metabolism of phenolic compounds due to some biotechnical work on microcapsules prepared from pine pollen that they have done.

Dr. Kefeli plans to speak about how university students can participate in the conception of industrial land-scape rehabilitation. Dr. Kefeli will speak about the creation of fabricated soil with long-lasting materials that are sources of carbon and nitrogen. Students will learn how this special soil can be applied to a bituminous mining landscape and for the cultivation of woody plants and poplars. The importance of cloning and biodiversity will also be discussed, as will the protective roles of willow and poplar plants against disease. Dr. Kefeli has been working with college students in the western Pennsylvania area for years to research these topics and others for use in the Slippery Rock Creek Watershed, and he plans to share the results of individual student projects with the university students in Germany.

B = purple


C = orange


D = red

New Grant Pays for Monitoring AMD Treatment Systems

A new grant program in Pennsylvania will cover the costs of chemical analyses to monitor passive mine drainage treatment systems. The **FACTS Grant** ("Funding AMD Chemistry in Treatment Systems") will ease the financial burden on cash-strapped grassroots watershed organizations that have accepted the responsibility of maintaining passive treatment systems.

In addition to funding laboratory analyses, the FACTS Grant streamlines the transfer of test results from laboratories using an Internet repository for water sampling data, called **Datashed**. Laboratories upload analysis results to Datashed using unique Sample IDs that link each water sample to a specific date, treatment system, and sampling location. Datashed will store the complete history of a passive treatment system, helping to diagnose problems and allowing researchers to study and evaluate various abandoned mine drainage treatment technologies.

The **Western Pennsylvania Coalition for Abandoned Mine Reclamation** (WPCAMR) oversees the FACTS Grant. The Datashed software is a collaboration by WPCAMR and Stream Restoration Inc. (to check it out, visit www.datashed.org).

Nonprofit watershed groups, county conservation districts, local governments, and RC&D councils in Pennsylvania can apply to the FACTS Grant program on the Web at http://www.wpcamr.org/facts. This site provides information including an overview of the FACTS program, details of FACTS for watershed groups, application requirements and materials, OM&R Plan requirements, a list of participating laboratories, and more.

WPCAMR has been providing hope for polluted lands and streams impacted by coal mining since 1982. WPCAMR is a coalition of 24 county conservation districts which work with citizen volunteers, students, industry, government agencies, watershed volunteers, environmental remediation experts, and others local grassroots efforts. The FACTS Grant is another fine example of their dedication to halting AMD and to an alliance of cooperative organizations in the bituminous coal region of western Pennsylvania.
