Fun for All at the Ohio River Watershed Celebration!

A refreshing cool breeze complimented the bright sunny skies to provide a perfect day for sailing Pittsburgh's Three Rivers on September 25 at the 7th Annual Ohio River Watershed Celebration! **Over 900** individuals participated in the ORWC festivities, which were highlighted by the 3-hour riverboat cruise. Participants interested in networking to learn about local watershed and energy conservation projects sailed aboard the Gateway Clipper's *Majestic*, while the "Under 18" student crowd enjoyed their own specially-tailored "imagination cruise" on the *Empress*. Before the boats set sail, all ages visited the environmental displays on both ships to participate in a fun "Watershed Treasure Hunt" designed for folks to search the dozens (~70!!!!) of displays for answers to questions such as "What mineral is responsible for causing PA's biggest water pollution issue, AMD"? and "List 1 benefit of wetlands." Those who completed the forms turned their papers in for a special cruise momento!!!

Two boats was not the only change to this year's event! Also new was a special focus on energy, a topic on many Americans' minds. Following welcoming remarks by Scott Roberts (PA DEP Deputy Secretary) and Jane Nugent ("Garden Talk" WMNY 1360AM), excitement grew in anticipation of the Watershed Awards Ceremony onboard the Majestic, with David Hess (former PA DEP Secretary) serving as the Master of Ceremony. A total of 8 volunteer organizations throughout the 24-county Ohio River Watershed were awarded cash prizes totaling \$3000 for their positive efforts in local watershed stewardship. Please see p. 2 for award winners!. Maggie Hall (PA DEP Regional Mgr, Energy & Tech. Deployment) gave an overview of energy conservation and introduced Nathaniel Doyno (Steel City Biofuels) talked about the subject of alternative fuels; and Dick Rosey (Solar Power Industries) provided a presentation on solar power. A guided narration of landmarks and points of interest by Dave Plank (ORWC volunteer) and Joe Dinkel (West View Water Authority) gave insight during the trip along the Ohio River, as everyone enjoyed the beautiful scenery and a chance to share with others dedicated to working together to improve our environment. Both ships voyaged through a lock, a fascinating experience, whether it is one's first time or tenth time! Thank you, Don Zeiler, US Army Corps of Engineers, for the "guided tour" as we "locked" through. Did you know that the Emsworth Lock and Dam was first operational in 1921 and averages about 550 commercial lockages every month, plus another 350-400 lockages of pleasure craft during the busy summer months?!?

Wil Taylor of Jennings Environmental Education Center deserves outstanding recognition for all of his hard work in organizing the Imagination Cruise for the student participants. Twenty-one organizations were involved in supplying educational displays, activities, demonstrations, and lessons for the kids onboard the *Empress*. Four thematic areas set up throughout the boat contained several activities created to instill an appreciation of the watersheds in which we live, and it was a non-stop learning adventure for the students as they tried hard to fit it all in! The "River of History" learning area gave students the unique opportunity to interact with re-enactors who were dressed in period costumes of the 1700s. An Indian trader, trapper, and settlers had fascinating stories to tell, skills to show off, and lots of equipment for kids to touch and explore. Mixing old with the new, historical landmarks were tracked with GPS units from the top deck of the boat, as students were taught how to use these technical devices. In "River of Life", students got up close with the animals that call the Ohio River Watershed home. Live specimens of turtles, salamanders, snakes, and toads were present, as were macroinvertebrates, for students to identify and learn more about. Birding was offered on the top deck (several folks observed a great blue heron at the lock and dam!), as was a fun water cycle activity. "Conserve Me a River" provided students hands-on science experiments and exhibits to show the value of regional conservation projects. There was an AMD investigation, waste water treatment activities, household hazardous wastes exhibit, microscope and leaf activities, and more! Lastly, in "Craft Me a River", students were able to make fish-print t-shirts, tie their own fly for fishing, and learn about fish adaptations by designing their own fish specific to a unique habitat! Thanks to every single person who helped the students learn so much and have a great time doing it!

The ORWC, open to the public and free of charge, is planned and organized by an all-volunteer committee. As this annual event continues to grow in scope and style we acknowledge everyone for playing a crucial role in this valuable partnership which helps make the cruises so fantastic! <u>Please see the back page of the Catalyst for a list of ORWC Sponsors and Partners</u> (there are many people to thank!!!) and consider joining us on next year's cruise!!!
