Westminster College Students Monitor the De Sale Phase 2 Passive System

For the fourth consecutive year, **Westminster College** students from **Dr. Helen Boylan's** Advanced Laboratory class have participated in a collaborative effort with the SRWC to monitor passive treatment systems within our watershed. The project provides the students with a practical hands-on experience that allows them the opportunity to not only apply what they have learned through classroom and laboratory instruction to a "real world" application, but also gain a better understanding of an important environmental issue such as abandoned mine drainage and environmentally-friendly methods to address the problem.

This year, the students conducted monitoring at the De Sale Phase 2 passive system. The students split into two groups to work with **Wil Taylor** of the **Jennings Environmental Education Center** and **Cliff Denholm** of **Stream Restoration Incorporated** to conduct water quality monitoring of each passive component. In addition, the students collected samples of the unnamed tributary to Seaton Creek upstream and downstream of where the water leaving the passive system enters.






Westminster College Students to Present Findings at November SRWC Meeting


