Slippery Rock Creek Watershed Conservation Plan (SRCWCP) Update

The latest round of public meetings for the Slippery Rock Creek Watershed Conservation Plan were completed during the second and third weeks of February 2011. Meetings were conducted at four locations: Plain Grove Twp. Municipal Building (2/8/11), Grove City High School Auditorium (2/9/11), Slippery Rock Twp. Municipal Building (2/10/11), and the Boyers Sportmen's Club (2/15/11). Representatives from the Slippery Rock Watershed Coalition, the SRCWCP Advisory Council, Stream Restoration Inc., BioMost, Inc., and from the Planning and Economic Development Associates, Inc. presented an overview of the current draft plan. The public provided lively conversation, insights, concerns, and ideas for the SRCWCP. A special thank you to everyone who took time out of their busy schedules to attend the meetings and to the municipal



officials of Plain Grove and Slippery Rock Townships; the administration of Grove City High School and the Boyers Sportsmen's Club for graciously allowing us to conduct the meetings at their facilities.

Dave Malarkey of radio station WISR in Butler also conducted an interview with **Laurie Popeck**, SRCWCP Project Facilitator, about the draft plan. The interview led to an informative discussion relating to the land, water, biological, and cultural resources in the watershed. A big <u>THANK YOU</u> to Mr. Malarkey and everyone at WISR/WBUT for the unique opportunity to be "on the air" to share our interest in the watershed.

We encourage all stakeholders in the 408-square mile Slippery Rock Creek Watershed to review the draft and submit written comments. The Draft SRCWCP can be viewed online at:

SAVE THE DATE - APRIL 30, 2011 - FREE PHARMACEUTICAL COLLECTION

The U.S. Dept. of Justice through the Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) will hold a nationwide pharmaceutical take-back day on **Saturday**, **April 30**th from **10:00 am until 2:00 pm**. Nationwide collection site information will soon be released and there are expected to be multiple locations in every county. (As available, the collection locations and dates will be included in the April 2011 issue of *The Catalyst* for the Slippery Rock Creek Watershed and vicinity.)

This "National Take Back Day" is sponsored by the DEA in coordination with local law enforcement agencies and community partners and aims to provide an opportunity for the public to drop off expired, unwanted, or unneeded medications for destruction. Removing these potentially dangerous drugs from our homes reduces risks to public health and safety. According to the DEA, all types of medications will be accepted on Take Back Day, including both prescription and over-the-counter substances.

<u>NOT ACCEPTED</u> at the collection: needles, radioactive medicines, bio-hazardous substances, thermometers or other medical devices.

The DEA advises that prescription drugs should not be flushed down the toilet or washed down the drain unless the label or accompanying patient information specifically instructs you to do so. For more information check out the DEA web site at www.dea.gov.



In a 2002 report published by the United States Geological Survey (USGS), chemicals used by nearly everyone were found in 139 streams and rivers in 30 states, including Pennsylvania. These chemicals include pharmaceuticals, hormones, and insect repellents to name a few and are known collectively as organic wastewater contaminants (OWCs). 
