Jennings Celebrates the Bloom!

On Saturday, July 20 Jennings Environmental Education Center was the place to be to experience one of the region's unique natural resources – the Blazing Star Prairie! Presented by **3MJC** and **Jennings Environmental Education Center** and sponsored by **Butler County Tourism and Convention Bureau** and the **Botanical Society of Western PA**, "Celebrate the Bloom" is an effort to showcase the Commonwealth's only preserved prairie. The event corresponds with the peak prairie bloom, which features a diversity of colorful flowers including the blazing star, sunflowers and Culver's root.



Autumn Leaves Will Soon Be Falling...

Soon it will be time to enjoy raking up (and jumping into!) big piles of leaves! Deciduous trees lose their leaves every winter. There are a number of reasons for leaf loss, but basically trees lose their leaves to conserve energy over the winter and prevent damage to the tree. Many deciduous trees are found in regions which have cold, dark, harsh winters. Trees lose their leaves to protect themselves during the winter months, as the cold dry winds in these regions would strip moisture from the trees through the leaves, which have a large surface area. By losing their leaves, trees can conserve their moisture in the trunk and branches, rather than drying out and dying. In addition, the leaf loss puts the tree into a state of dormancy, and greatly reduces the amount of energy that the tree needs to stay alive. The tree's leaves fall down to the ground, providing a layer of protective mulch to insulate their roots, and the tree conserves its energy for the next year and a new growing season. Maple trees are one type of deciduous tree that lose their leaves. A maple leaf maze is provided below for you to try to navigate through! Jennings Passive System Rehabilitation Celebration - October 7, 2013

The Jennings Environmental Education Center, Slippery Rock Watershed Coalition, and Stream Restoration Incorporated would like to invite you to attend a celebration of the rehabilitation of the Jennings Passive Treatment System. The event will be held at the Jennings Environmental Education Center on **Monday**, **October 7th at 11:30 AM**.

Being located in a Pennsylvania State Park and within the Slippery Rock Creek Watershed, the Jennings site has long been an important demonstration, education, and research facility regarding mine reclamation practices and passive, as well as small active, treatment development. Field applications of various technologies have been installed by numerous federal and state agencies, colleges and universities, and the Slippery Rock Watershed Coalition including the early use of treatment wetlands in the 1980s, the demonstration of plugging issues in Anoxic Limestone Drains for discharges with high aluminum concentrations, the use of mixed media in Vertical Flow Ponds, the utilization of test tanks for a variety of treatment media, the implementation of OSM Appalachian Regional Reforestation Initiative practices, the development of plots for various types of vegetation, the development of fabricated soil, and many others.

Last year, after 15 years of successful operation, the treatment media of the Vertical Flow Pond was removed, encapsulated on site with Mineral CSA (provided by project partner, **Harsco Minerals**) and new piping and treatment media placed. The system well outlasted the original estimated 10-year design-life!

The rehabilitation was made possible due to the following organizations and funding programs: Foundation for Pennsylvania Watersheds, Pennsylvania Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, US Office of Surface Mining Reclamation and Enforcement's Watershed Cooperative Agreement Program, WPCAMR's Quick Response Program (PA DEP Growing Greener funded), Harsco Minerals, Jennings Environmental Education Center, BioMost, Inc., Stream Restoration Incorporated's O&M Technical Assistance Program (PA DEP Growing Greener funded), and local citizen volunteers.

Please join us as we celebrate the successes of the Jennings system! We will be meeting at the Center (main building) located at 2951 Prospect Road, Slippery Rock, PA 16057 near the intersection of State Route 8 and State Route 528. Light refreshments will be provided. Attendees will have the option of walking or riding a shuttle to the nearby project location.
