American Society of Reclamation Sciences: Inspiration in Idaho

The 40th annual meeting of the American Society of Reclamation Sciences (ASRS) was held from June 4 – 7 in Boise, Idaho, and attended by several members of the SRWC. This was the second conference for the society with the current name, which was previously known as the American Society of Mining and Reclamation (ASMR). The DeLamar Mine field tour was a wonderful way to kick off the conference proceedings. A very knowledgeable group from Integra Resources shared the rich history of the site, including the battles fought in the War Eagle Mine underground in the 1800s. Located near Silver City, Idaho, the gold and silver mine has a long history of various stages of active development and reclamation. Silver City is an historic and artistic town known for its associations with Billy the Kid and Geronimo, but is only occupied by most of its residents seasonally due to the annual snowfall. Current efforts for reclamation include seasonal capture of water which is treated and pumped to a land application system which is distributed through a sprinkler system. Because of the high elevation and yearly snowfall, a limited window exists each year for water treatment. Exploratory drilling has taken place which may precede possible future mining of existing reclaimed tailings piles using newer methods, as well as mining in new areas.

Back in Boise, a varied group of presenters from industry professionals, academia, and regulatory agencies provided a wide range of expertise and shared their knowledge and new experiences. Presentation



topics at the conference varied greatly in scope and included water treatment, carbon dioxide monitoring, mine reclamation, and urban landscape reforestation. Along with the wonderful poster presentations on Tuesday evening, mother nature provided quite the display with hail storms and a double rainbow.

The riverfront parks, Boise Zoo, art museums, state capitol building, and a multitude of restaurant and refreshment options held plenty of opportunities for conference attendees to enjoy all that Boise had to offer during the free lunch and dinner breaks. Keep an eye out for ghosts if you tour the old Idaho State Penitentiary! And remember - if visiting in June, even if it isn't in the forecast, don't forget your rain coat!


